General Information

A total of 124 semester (186 quarter) credits are required for a Bachelor of Arts or Science degree from Northwest Christian University (NCU). 27 semester (40.5 quarter) credits must be in upper division (300-400 level) courses.

Admissions Requirements

To be considered for admission, applicants must have:

1. A minimum of two years of work experience, community service, and/or program development responsibilities
2. A 2.0 cumulative grade-point average or higher from institutions of higher learning
3. Submission of a resume
4. Submission of an application and a \$25 application fee
5. Submission of official transcripts from all colleges attended



Will you have an AAOT?

If yes, that's good news! Here's what you need to know:

1. Your AAOT will automatically satisfy NCU's general education core requirements, with the exception of Bible courses and possibly some electives.
2. Depending on how many credits you earn with your AAOT, you may need to earn additional credits of electives outside the ADP to reach the overall total of 124 semester (186 quarter) credits. Only courses with a grade of C- or better will transfer. Developmental courses such as WR115 or lower, and math courses below MTH 105 will *not* transfer. Vocational/professional/technical courses are not recommended, as these may not transfer if they don't fulfill graduation requirements.
3. **PSYCHOLOGY STUDENTS:** If you are interested in the ADP Psychology degree, as part of your AAOT you should take UCC's PSY 201 and 202 or 203, and one of the following sets of biology courses: BI 103 plus one

additional biology course (any); OR BI 212 plus one additional biology course (any); OR BI 231 and 232, which are prerequisites. If you take MTH 243 and/or PSY 239 at UCC, these will transfer as equivalent courses for NCU's MATH 310 or PSY 420 respectively in the major, but you *will still need to meet the graduation requirement of 40 semester upper division credits*.

4. **BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION STUDENTS:** As part of your AAOT, you should take BA 101, ECON 201, 202, and 203. If you take UCC's accounting sequence, BA211, 212, and 213, these will meet NCU's Principles of Accounting (ACTG 211 & 212) in the major. If you take MTH 243, this will meet NCU's MATH 310 requirement.

No problem! The following is for you:

General Education Core Requirements

Students need to complete courses in the following five areas at the 100 level or higher:

1. **Writing**
 - A) WR 121 & 122– English Composition
 - B) WR 123– English Composition/Research
2. **Humanities:** 15 semester (22.5 quarter) credits, which must include:
 - A) One Communications course
 - B) One course in Ethics
 - C) One course in Literature
 - D) The remaining credits from any of the above, or Art History/Appreciation, Music Appreciation, Philosophy, or Foreign Languages
3. **Social Science:** 15 semester (22.5 quarter) credits, which must include at least one history course and one course in another area: Anthropology, Criminal Justice, Economics, Business, Education, Geography, History, Human Services, Law, Political Science, Psychology, Comparative Religions, Sociology
4. **Math, Science, Computers:** At least one course from each area, with a minimum of 6 semester (9 quarter) credits
 - A) College math – must be MTH 105 or higher
 - B) General science with a lab. **Psychology** majors only: must have UCC's BI 103 and one other biology course, or BI 212 and one other biology course, or BI 231 and 232 (or take BIOL 130/LAB at NCU).
 - C) Computers – CIS 125S (Office Applications-Spreadsheets) or CIS 120 are highly recommended
5. **Diversity Requirement:** At least one course that honors the diversity of persons, cultures, backgrounds, beliefs, or ideas *different than the student's own*. Many approved courses may also fulfill requirements in other areas of the general education core. See suggested course listings under "UCC transferrable courses into NCU."
6. **Bible:** *Not available at UCC*
7. **PSYCHOLOGY STUDENTS:** If you are interested in the ADP Psychology degree, as part of your AAOT you should take UCC's PSY 201 and 202 or 203, and one of the following sets of biology courses: BI 103 plus one additional biology course (any); OR BI 212 plus one additional biology course (any); OR BI 231 and 232, which are prerequisites. If you take MTH 243 and/or PSY 239 at UCC, these will transfer as equivalent courses for NCU's MATH 310 or PSY 420 respectively in the major, but you *will still need to meet the graduation requirement of 40 semester upper division credits*.
8. **BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION STUDENTS:** As part of your AAOT, you should take BA 101, ECON 201, 202, and 203. If you take UCC's accounting sequence, BA211, 212, and 213, these will meet NCU's Principles of Accounting (ACTG 211 & 212) in the major. If you take MTH 243, this will meet NCU's MATH 310 requirement.

Acceptable Programs for Transfer of Credit and Limitations

NCU accepts credits from the following programs with the stated limitations:

1. Military and Police/Fire Training as recommended by the American Council on Education: no maximum, but credits must meet degree requirements

2. College Level Exam Program (CLEP) no maximum, but credits must meet degree requirements
3. Vocational/professional/technical courses: all credits must meet degree requirements
4. SFE/CWE credits: 16 semester (24 quarter) credits maximum
5. Prior learning assessment portfolio: 30 semester (45 quarter) credits maximum
6. PE credits: 8 semester (12 quarter) credits maximum, and no more than two with the same course number
7. Music performance and studio arts credits: same restrictions as PE
8. Only courses with a grade of C- or better transfer.
9. Course work that is "developmental" (generally less than 100 level) will not transfer. UCC's WR115 or lower, and math courses below MTH 105 will *not* transfer.
